

Kwale District Eye Centre Biannual Report July–December 2010

Funding continues to decline

We rely on donations so, to match our reduced income, we have had to drastically cut staff numbers, field activities, training and the number of vehicles.

We have been forced to redefine our targets, expecting to achieve fewer cataract operations, less integration of low vision and blind children into society and school, and fewer patients treated.

There was some improvement towards the end of the year, but adequate funding remains the

key issue as to how much we can do to help those in need.

Skills Development

In order to provide quality care we keep our staff abreast of new skills and technology.

Our Nurse-In-Charge attended a Training of Trainers (TOT) course to enable her to transfer skills.

We sent two nurses for a 3-month skills up-grading course in Ophthalmology. They topped their class with an excellent performance.

Low Vision & Education

We continue to identify more children with low vision each year. These children still face stigma and discrimination.

Currently we support 469 children with severe visual impairment in our programme, of whom 130 have albinism.

Rehabilitation of Irreversibly Blind

This programme was the worst affected by the cuts in funding.

Children and young adults who are irreversibly blind need to receive training to realise their full potential.

If this does not happen, they will revert to their old lives, where they are discriminated against and stand almost no chance of realizing their basic human rights- to an education, employment and a normal life.

School Integration

Despite being totally blind, these children attend a normal school. They need teachers trained in special needs; both low vision and Braille.

These children were lucky enough to have a teacher but they still needed Braille machines and paper.

Eye Camps

In remote areas where no static eye services exist, we work closely with the community and local authorities to ensure that the socio-economic burden of avoidable blindness is reduced.

Wundanyi Camp—150 kms NW of Mombasa

In response to a request from the local Constituency Development Fund (CDF) and the area MP, 55 people received sight-restoring cataract surgery.

Rhamu Eye Camp

In response to a request by the local community through The Sayyid Abass Foundation, we travelled 1,200kms to Rhamu, a village near Mandera in the far north-east of Kenya, not far from the border with Somalia and Ethiopia. Patients turned up in huge numbers. Most of them were blinded by cataract.

In this hot, dusty area, with only solar power available, the team saw over 1,200 people and performed 234 cataract operations in only six days.

21 year old Sowda had been totally blind for six years. She had to be led to the camp.

After surgery she described how wonderful it was to see again after six years of darkness. Sowda did not have her second eye done because there were too many other blind people who needed surgery. We hope to operate on her second eye on our next visit.


